Shavuot

May 26th - May 27th, 2023

Shavuot is known as the Feast of Weeks in English and as Pentecost in Latin and ancient Greek. Shavuot has a double significance: it marks the wheat harvest (Exodus 34:22), as well as the harvest of the first summer fruits (Deuteronomy 8:8; 26:1-10) in Israel, and it commemorates the anniversary of the day when God gave the Torah to the nation of Israel assembled at Mount Sinai.

The holiday is one of the Shalosh Regalim, the three Biblical pilgrimage festivals. The word Shavuot means weeks, and it marks the conclusion of the Counting of the Omer. Its date is directly linked to that of Passover; the Torah mandates the seven-week Counting of the Omer, beginning on the second day of Passover, to be immediately followed by Shavuot. Jewish people around the world understand this counting of days and weeks to express anticipation and desire for the giving of the Torah. On Passover, the people of Israel were freed from their enslavement to Pharaoh; on Shavuot, they were given the Torah and became a nation committed to serving God. Shavuot is celebrated in Israel for one day and in the Diaspora for two days. Reform Judaism celebrates only one day, even in the Diaspora.

Some Shavuot practices include staying up all night on the first evening to study Torah, called Layl Tikkun Shavuot in celebration of God's giving the Torah and our willingness to receive its teachings. Another practice is to eat dairy products on this holy day. There are many reasons given for it but the one most probable is that Israel is known as "a land flowing with milk and honey," reflecting the agricultural connection to the holy day.

Resident Rights in the Apotex

There are 29 Resident Rights written under the *Fixing Long Term Care* Act. These are known as the Bill of Rights for people who live in Ontario long term care homes.

In April we focus on the following resident rights:

- 20. Every resident has a right to ongoing and safe support from their caregivers to support their physical, mental, social and emotional wellbeing and their quality of life and to assistance in contacting a caregiver or other person to support their needs. - 21. Every resident has the right to have any friend, family member, caregiver or other person of importance to the resident attend any meeting with the licensee or the staff of the home.

Caregiver Corner

The Benefits of Arts Engagement for Caregivers Kathleen Downie, Creative Arts Worker, Baycrest

In her report Re-imagining Long-term Residential Care in the COVID-19 Crisis, Pat Armstrong reminds us that the conditions of work are the conditions of care. At Baycrest, we are fortunate to have a broad base of richly funded resources including The Creative Arts Studio! As a member of the Culture & Arts team, I feel privileged and proud to work with so many talented colleagues, and to share my abilities with residents, patients, families and care-workers. In writing this brief article I aim to accomplish two things. First, to offer accessible and easy arts-based approaches that care-workers can use with their clients. And secondly, to emphasize the potential of the arts to elevate the conditions of care. When care-workers engage the arts with their clients, even for a few minutes, they may experience feelings of mutually-shared respite.

Having a few art books, curious objects and tactile materials on hand (close to the nursing station) can provide moments of engagement for residents that can be shared, and used as an opportunity for care workers to sit (even for two minutes) and explore something new. A clipboard with newsprint sheets attached and coloured pencils at the ready, can provide 10-20 minutes of focused engagement for a client prompted by a question. "Would you draw a picture of this cup"? Even better, a care-worker might sit down to make a quick sketch of the cup first. Strategies developed by Camp's Montessori for Dementia model also provide excellent resources for care-workers. Best of all, ask me if you would like some guidance in setting up a few activities that you can use to uplift your clients experience and contribute to your own sense of joy!
